The Home Economics 4 class has been studying grooming. The group spent an afternoon at the

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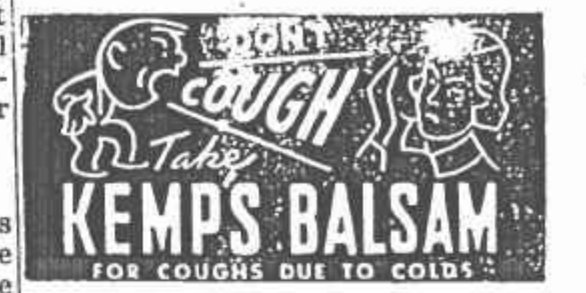

The cafeteria is serving approximately 140 students per day—and observing the required meatless day each week.

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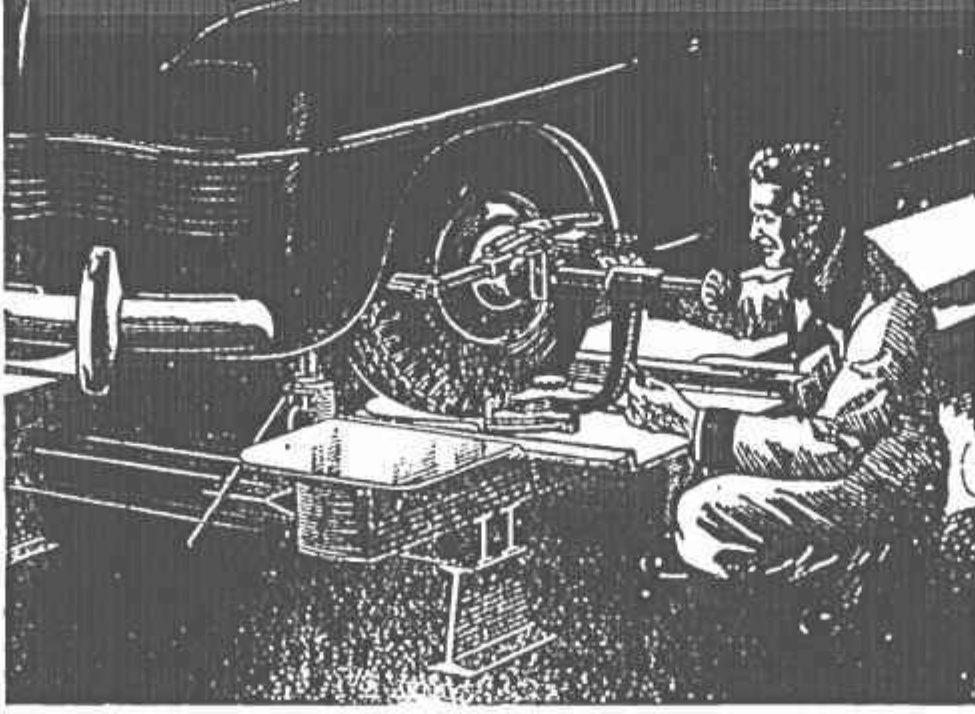


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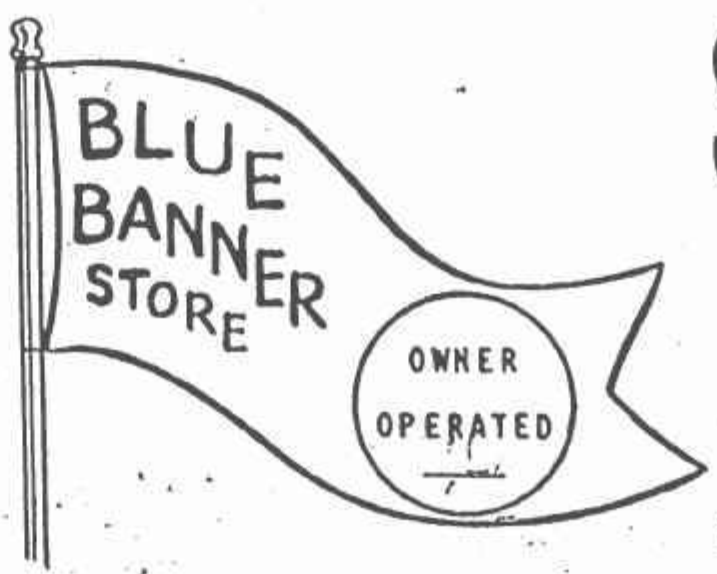
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
