The Green Thumb

DANDELION NOTES: When the eminent horticulturist, L. H. Bailey was asked what to do with dandelions in the lawn, his stock answer was "learn to like them." Since it's almost an endless battle fighting dandelions, you might change your tactics and eat the greens and the blossoms. Ever try french-frying the blossoms? Here is a recipe passed along to us for french-fried dandelion blossoms: First, gather a batch of blossoms; look them over and wash them thoroughly. Roll the blooms in a towel to remove the excess moisture. Dip each blossom in flour and fry in deep fat. Sprinkle lightly with salt and you'll find they're delicious.

Incidentally, a strictly tee-totaler's beverage can be made from the blossoms. Here's how to make Dandelion cordial: Use 1 qt. of blossoms (pressed down), 2 qts. of boiling water; 3 cups sugar syrup, 2 oranges, 2 lemons. Pick dandelions close to blossoms, pour boiling water over them. Set aside to cool, then strain and add sugar syrup, and oranges and lemons thinly sliced. Let mixture stand for 2 or 3 days. If kept longer, strain out orange and lemon, bottle and cork tightly. This makes 2 quarts of healthy beverage, so our correspondent tells us.

GLADIOLUS NOTES: This is just a reminder to treat your bulbs before planting them. Any pre-planting treatment will save you a lot of trouble later on. Many commercial growers use New Improved Ceresan dip, 1 ounce to 3 gallons of water for 15 mins. Ly-sol, 1 1/2 tablespoonfuls per gallon of water for 3 hours is dip for glad bulbs, regardless of the material you use, be sure to plant the bulbs the same day you dip them. If held over, the bulbs may be harmed, so be safe and plant them right after you dip them. Most growers do not bother to peel or husk the bulbs before dipping and planting. The only reason for so doing would be to see if there is disease under the husk. If you've got the time, you can remove the husks. Glads do not stand wet feet, so plant them in a well drained soil, and in a spot that gets sun nearly all day. Do not plant glads near beans as glads, sometimes get bean mosaic, a disease that spots the flowers and ruins the bulbs.
